


Instructions for Care and Operation

The notebook computer is quite rugged, but it can be damaged. To prevent this, follow these suggestions:


1. Don't drop it, or expose it to shock. If the computer falls, the case and the components could be damaged.




Keep it dry, and don't overheat it. Keep the computer and power supply away from any kind of heating element. This is an electrical appliance. If water or any other liquid gets into it, the computer could be badly damaged.



- 3. **Avoid interference.** Keep the computer away from high capacity transformers, electric motors, and other strong magnetic fields. These can hinder proper performance and damage your data.
- 4. **Follow the proper working procedures for the computer.** Shut the computer down properly and don't forget to save your work. Remember to periodically save your data as data may be lost if the battery is depleted.



5. Take care when using peripheral devices.



Servicing



- 5. The AC/DC adapter uses voltages from 100 to 240 volts so you won't need a second voltage adapter. However, check with your travel agent to see if you need any socket adapters.
- Put the notebook in its carrying bag and secure it with the bag's straps. 6.
- If you're taking any peripherals (e.g. a printer, mouse or digital camera), pack them and those devices' adapters 7. and/or cables.
- 8. Anticipate customs - Some jurisdictions may have import restrictions or require proof of ownership for both hardware and software. Make sure your "papers" are handy.



Power Off Before Traveling

Make sure that your notebook is completely powered off before putting it into a travel bag (or any such container). Putting a notebook which is powered on in a travel bag may cause the Vents/Fan Intakes to be blocked. To prevent your computer from overheating make sure nothing blocks the Vent/Fan Intakes while the computer is in use.

On the Road

In addition to the general safety and maintenance suggestions in this preface, and Chapter 8: Troubleshooting, keep these points in mind:

Hand-carry the notebook - For security, don't let it out of your sight. In some areas, computer theft is very common. Don't check it with "normal" luggage. Baggage handlers may not be sufficiently careful. Avoid knocking the computer against hard objects.

Beware of Electromagnetic fields - Devices such as metal detectors & X-ray machines can damage the computer, hard disk, floppy disks, and other media. They may also destroy any stored data - Pass your computer and disks around the devices. Ask security officials to hand-inspect them (you may be asked to turn it on). **Note**: Some airports also scan luggage with these devices.

Fly safely - Most airlines have regulations about the use of computers and other electronic devices in flight. These restrictions are for your safety, follow them. If you stow the notebook in an overhead compartment, make sure it's secure. Contents may shift and/or fall out when the compartment is opened.

Get power where you can - If an electrical outlet is available, use the AC/DC adapter and keep your battery(ies) charged.

Keep it dry - If you move quickly from a cold to a warm location, water vapor can condense inside the computer. Wait a few minutes before turning it on so that any moisture can evaporate.

Developing Good Work Habits

Developing good work habits is important if you need to work in front of the computer for long periods of time. Improper work habits can result in discomfort or serious injury from repetitive strain to your hands, wrists or other joints. The following are some tips to reduce the strain:



- Adjust the height of the chair and/or desk so that the keyboard is at or slightly below the level of your elbow. Keep your forearms, wrists, and hands in a relaxed position.
- Your knees should be slightly higher than your hips. Place your feet flat on the floor or on a footrest if necessary.
- Use a chair with a back and adjust it to support your lower back comfortably.
- Sit straight so that your knees, hips and elbows form approximately 90-degree angles when you are working.
- Take periodic breaks if you are using the computer for long periods of time.



Remember to:

- Alter your posture frequently.
- Stretch and exercise your body several times a day.
- Take periodic breaks when you work at the computer for long periods of time. Frequent and short breaks are better than fewer and longer breaks.

Lighting

Proper lighting and a comfortable viewing angle can reduce eye strain and shoulder and neck muscle fatigue.

- Position the display to avoid glare or reflections from overhead lighting or outside sources of light.
- Keep the display screen clean and set the brightness and contrast to levels that allow you to see the screen clearly.
- Position the display directly in front of you at a comfortable viewing distance.
- Adjust the display-viewing angle to find the best position.

LCD Screen Care

To prevent **image persistence** on LCD monitors (caused by the continuous display of graphics on the screen for an extended period of time) take the following precautions:

- Set the Windows Power Plans to turn the screen off after a few minutes of screen idle time.
- Use a rotating, moving or blank screen saver (this prevents an image from being displayed too long).
- Rotate desktop background images every few days.
- Turn the monitor off when the system is not in use.

LCD Electro-Plated Logos

Note that in computers featuring a raised LCD electro-plated logo, the logo is covered by a protective adhesive. Due to general wear and tear, this adhesive may deteriorate over time and the exposed logo may develop sharp edges. Be careful when handling the computer in this case, and avoid touching the raised LCD electro-plated logo. Avoid placing any other items in the carrying bag which may rub against the top of the computer during transport. If any such wear and tear develops contact your distributor/supplier.

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Drivers

Drivers are programs which act as an interface between the computer and a hardware component e.g. a wireless network module. It is very important that you install the drivers in the order listed. You will be unable to use most advanced controls until the necessary drivers and utilities are properly installed. If your system hasn't been properly configured (your service representative may have already done that for you); refer to Chapter 4 for installation instructions.

Ports and Jacks

See "Interface (Ports & Jacks)" on page A - 1 for a description of the interface (ports & jacks) which allow your computer to communicate with external devices, connect to the internet etc.

System Startup

- 1. Remove all packing materials, and place the computer on a stable surface.
- 2. Securely attach any peripherals you want to use with the notebook (e.g. keyboard and mouse) to their ports.
- Attach the AC/DC adapter to the DC-In jack on the left of the computer, then plug the AC power cord into an outlet, and connect the AC power cord to the AC/DC adapter (make sure you use the adapter when first setting up the computer, as to safeguard the computer during shipping the battery will be locked to not power the system until first connected to the AC/DC adapter).
- 4. Use one hand to raise the lid/LCD to a comfortable viewing angle (**do not exceed 130 degrees**); use the other hand to support the base of the computer (**Note**: **Never** lift the computer by the lid/LCD).



Figure 1 - 2 LCD Panel Open Model A



System Map: LCD Panel Open - Model C







Figure 1 - 6 - Keyboard - Models B & C


Figure 1 - 8 Front & Left Views Model A


Figure 1 - 9 Front & Left Views Model B

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Disk Eject Warning




Figure 1 - 14 Bottom View Model A

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




Figure 1 - 16 Bottom View Model C





Throughout this manual you will see an instruction to open the **Control Panel**. Right-click the lower left hot corner to bring up the context menu (or use the **Windows Logo Key** \blacksquare + X key combination) and select **Control Panel in both the Desktop app or Start screen**.




Figure 1 - 19 - Windows Context Menu

The Control Panel can be accessed in a number of ways in *Windows 8.1*.

- Click **Search** in the **Windows Charms Bar** (see previous page) and the search pane will pop out. Type *Control Panel* and select it from the results to the left.
- Click on **This PC** (in Apps, or you can to pin **This PC** to the **Start** screen), click on **Computer** in the top menu and select **Open Control Panel** from the ribbon.
- When in the **Desktop** app (this does not apply to the Start screen) click on **Settings** in the **Windows Charms Bar** and select **Control Panel** from the menu.
- Click the arrow at the bottom of the Start screen and click Control Panel in Apps (Windows System).

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Keyboard Shortcut to Control Panel

Display Most Recently Used Apps




Figure 1 - 20 - Advanced Context Menu (Right-Click Start Button)

Windows 8.1 Taskbar




Figure 1 - 26 - Taskbar & Notification Area (System Tray)






Figure 1 - 28 - Screen Resolution






Figure 1 - 29 - Intel Graphics Control Panel

Power Options

Power Options (Hardware and Sound) can be accessed from the Control Panel. 


Running Apps

To run apps in *Windows 8.1* you will need to check that the **Screen Resolution** and **User Account Control Settings** are compatible with the system requirements.

Screen Resolution Settings

If your computer meets the minimum screen resolution requirements, and still you can't run apps, then that you have to check the status of **User Account Control** (UAC). Apps may fail to open when the UAC is turned off. To check whether the UAC is on or off, follow the instructions below.

- 2. Click on User Accounts and then click on Change User Account Control settings (or click System and Security and click Change User Account Control Settings under Action Center).

Hard Disk Drive/Solid State Drive

The hard disk drive/solid state drive is used to store your data in the computer. The hard disk can be taken out to accommodate other serial (SATA) hard disk drives, however you will need to contact your distributor/supplier to do this in order to avoid violating the terms of your warranty. The system can also support solid state drives as storage devices (see "*Storage*" on page D - 2 for specification information).



Caddy Bay Devices

Model B & C computers support a caddy bay for the installation of a storage device. e.g. HDD. Note that the device installed in the caddy bay is to be used for data storage only, and will not support the installation of an OS (Operating System).

Optical (CD/DVD) Device

There is a bay for a 5.25" optical (CD/DVD) device (12.7mm height). The actual device will depend on the module you purchased (see "Storage" on page D - 2). The optical device is usually labeled "Drive D:" and may be used as a boot device if properly set in the **BIOS** (see "Boot Menu" on page 5 - 14).

Loading Discs

To insert a CD/DVD, press the open button (1) and carefully place a CD/DVD onto the disc tray with label-side facing up (use just enough force for the disc to click onto the tray's spindle). Gently push the CD/DVD tray in until its lock "clicks" and you are ready to start. The busy indicator 2 will light up while data is being accessed, or while an audio/video CD, or DVD, is playing. If power is unexpectedly interrupted, insert an object such as a straightened paper clip into the emergency eject hole 3 to open the tray.

Sound Volume Adjustment

How high the sound volume can be set depends on the setting of the volume control within Windows. Click the Volume icon on the notification area to check the setting (see "Audio Features" on page 2 - 24).

CD Emergency Eject

If you need to manually eject a CD (e.g. due to an unexpected power interruption) you may push the end of a straightened paper clip into the emergency eject hole. However please do NOT use a sharpened pencil or similar object that may break and become lodged in the hole.

Disk Eject Warning

Don't try to remove a CD/DVD while the system is accessing it. This may cause the system to "crash".

Handling CDs or DVDs

Proper handling of your CDs/DVDs will prevent them from being damaged. Please follow the advice below to make sure that the data stored on your CDs/DVDs can be accessed.

Note the following:

- Hold the CD or DVD by the edges; do not touch the surface of the disc.
- Use a clean, soft, dry cloth to remove dust or fingerprints.
- Do not write on the surface with a pen.
- Do not attach paper or other materials to the surface of the disc.
- Do not store or place the CD or DVD in high-temperature areas.
- Do not use benzene, thinner, or other cleaners to clean the CD or DVD.
- Do not bend the CD or DVD.
- Do not drop or subject the CD or DVD to shock.

DVD Regional Codes

To change the DVD regional codes:

- 1. Go to the Control Panel
- Double-click Device Manager (Hardware and Sound > Devices and Printers), then click the arrow next to DVD/CD-ROM drives.
- Double-click on the DVD-ROM device to bring up the Properties dialog box, and select the DVD Region (tab) to bring up the control panel to allow you to adjust the regional code.
- 4. DVD region detection is device dependent, not OS-dependent. You can select your module's region code **5** times. The fifth selection is permanent. This cannot be altered even if you change your operating system or you use the module in another computer.

Push-Push Card Reader (Model C Computers)

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The card reader in **Model C** computers features a push-in/push-out card insertion and ejection mechanism. Simply push the card to insert and eject it.

Multi-In-1 Card Reader

The card reader allows you to use some of the latest digital storage cards. Push the card into the slot and it will appear as a removable device, and can be accessed in the same way as your hard disk (s). Make sure you install the card reader driver (see *"CardReader" on page 4 - 6*).



Touchpad and Buttons/Mouse

The Touchpad is an alternative to the mouse; however, you can also add a mouse to your computer through one of the USB ports. The Touchpad buttons function in much the same way as a two-button mouse.





The **mouse button zones** at the bottom of the pad are defined by the line at the **bottom** of the pad, and the **left and right buttons** are divided roughly down the middle as illustrated below. The active area of the touchpad is that defined in the diagram below. Press the left button zone for a left click, and right button zone for a right click action.


Figure 2 - 7 Mouse Properties -Device Settings


Disabling the Touchpad



PalmCheck[™]

The PalmCheckTM feature (**Device Settings** > **Settings** > **Pointing** > **Sensitivity**) helps prevent operating the Clickpad/Touchpad by accident, by recognizing when your palm is resting on it or brushing its surface while you are typing.



Scrolling

The Two-Finger scrolling feature works in most scrollable windows and allows you to scroll horizontally and vertically. Place two fingers, slightly separated, on the Touchpad surface and slide both fingers in the direction required (in a straight continuous motion).



Zooming



One-Finger

Drag and Drop




Figure 2 - 19





Setup for Audio Recording

To record audio sources on your computer at optimum quality follow the instructions below:

- 1. Go to the Control Panel.
- 2. Click Realtek HD Audio Manager (Hardware and Sound), or right-click the taskbar icon and select Sound Manager.

Chapter 3: Power Management

Overview

To conserve power, especially when using the battery, your computer power management conserves power by controlling individual components of the computer (the monitor and hard disk drive) or the whole system. This chapter covers:

- The Power Sources
- Turning On the Computer
- Power Plans
- Power-Saving States
- Configuring the Power Buttons
- Battery Information
- Intel® Dynamic Platform & Thermal Framework
- Removing the Battery for Model B Computers
- Removing the Battery for Model C Computers

The computer uses enhanced power saving techniques to give the operating system (OS) direct control over the power and thermal states of devices and processors. For example, this enables the OS to set devices into low-power states based on user settings and information from applications.

Power management functions will vary slightly depending on your operating system. For more information it is best to refer to the user's manual of your operating system.

OS Note

Power Management

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Forced Off

If the system "hangs", and the **Ctrl + Alt + Del** key combination doesn't work, press the power button for **4 seconds**, or longer, to force the system to turn itself off.

The Power Sources

The computer can be powered by either an AC/DC adapter or a battery pack.

AC/DC Adapter

Use only the AC/DC adapter that comes with your computer. The wrong type of AC/DC adapter will damage the computer and its components.

- 1. Attach the AC/DC adapter to the DC-in jack on the left of the computer.
- Plug the AC power cord into an outlet, and connect the AC power cord to the AC/ DC adapter (make sure you use the adapter when first setting up the computer, as to safeguard the computer during shipping the battery will be locked to not power the system until first connected to the AC/DC adapter).
- 3. Raise the lid/LCD to a comfortable viewing angle.
- 4. Press the power button to turn "On".

Battery

The battery allows you to use your computer while you are on the road or when an electrical outlet is unavailable. Battery life varies depending on the applications and the configuration you're using. To increase battery life, let the battery discharge completely before recharging (see "*Battery FAQ*" on page 3 - 18).

We recommend that you do not remove the battery. For more information on the battery, please refer to "*Battery Information*" on page 3 - 14.

Turning On the Computer

Now you are ready to begin using your computer. To turn it on simply press the power button on the front panel.

When the computer is on, you can use the power button as a Stand by/Hibernate/ Shutdown hot-key button when it is pressed for less than **4 seconds** (pressing and holding the power button for longer than this will shut the computer down). Use **Power Options** (**Hardware and Sound**) in the *Windows* control panel to configure this feature.

P

Power Button as Stand by or Hibernate Button

You can use the OS's "Power Options" control panel to set the power button to send the system into Stand by or Hibernate mode (see your OS's documentation, or *"Configuring the Power Buttons" on page 3 - 9* for details).

Shutting the Computer Down

Note that you should always shut your computer down by choosing the **Shut down** command as this will help prevent hard disk or system problems. Use the **Shut down** *or sign out* item in the **Context Menu** (right-click the lower left corner of the screen to bring up the menu).

You can also use the **Power Menu** in **Settings** in the **Windows Charms Bar**. If you want to add Hibernate/Sleep to the Power Menu see "Adding Hibernate/Sleep to the Power Menu" on page 3 - 10.




Figure 3 - 1 Shut Down/Restart


Power Plans

The computer can be configured to conserve power by means of **power plans**. You can use (or modify) an existing **power plan**, or create a new one.

The settings may be adjusted to set the **display** to turn off after a specified time, and to send the computer into **Sleep** after a period of inactivity.

Click *Change plan settings* and then click *Change advanced power settings* to access further configuration options in **Advanced Settings**.

See *"Intel® Dynamic Platform & Thermal Framework" on page 3 - 22* for further advanced power plan settings.



Resuming Operation


See **Table 3 - 1**, **on page 3 - 11** for information on how to resume from a power-saving state.

Password

It is recommended that you enable a password on system resume in order to protect your data.

Figure 3 - 2 Power Plan Advanced Settings Each *Windows* **power plan** will also adjust the processor performance of your machine in order to save power. This is worth bearing in mind if you are experiencing any reduced performance (especially under DC/battery power).

Choose **High performance** (you may need to click **Show additional plans** to view the High performance plan) for maximum performance when the computer is powered from an AC power source. Choose the **Power saver** (bear in mind that this scheme may slow down the overall performance of the computer in order to save power) for maximum power saving when the computer is battery (DC power) powered.



Power-Saving States

You can use power-saving states to stop the computer's operation and restart where you left off. *Windows* uses the **Sleep, Hibernate** and **Shut Down** power-saving states.

Sleep

In **Sleep** all of your work, settings and preferences are saved to memory before the system sleeps. When you are not using your computer for a certain length of time, which you specify in the operating system, it will enter **Sleep** to save power.

The PC wakes from **Sleep within seconds** and will return you to where you last left off (what was on your desktop) without reopening the application(s) and file(s) you last used.

If your mobile PC in **Sleep** is running on battery power the system will use only a minimum amount of power. After an extended period the system will save all the information to the hard disk and shut the computer down before the battery becomes depleted.

To add **Sleep** to the **Power Menu** see "Adding Hibernate/Sleep to the Power Menu" on page 3 - 10.

Wake On LAN Support

Wake-On-LAN is only supported from **Sleep** or **Hibernate** states *in Windows*.

If you require your computer to wake up from network activity in Windows then make sure that the computer is either in **Sleep** or **Hibernate**.

Wake-On-LAN is not supported from Shutdown states in *Windows*.

Power Management

Hibernate

Hibernate uses the least amount of power of all the power-saving states and saves all of your information on a part of the hard disk before it turns the system off. If a power failure occurs the system can restore your work from the hard disk; if a power failure occurs when work is saved only to memory, then the work will be lost. **Hibernate** will also return you to where you last left off within seconds. You should put your mobile PC into **Hibernate** if you will not use the computer for a period of time, and will not have the chance to charge the battery. To add **Hibernate** to the **Power Menu** see "*Adding Hibernate/Sleep to the Power Menu*" on page 3 - 10.

Shut down

You should **Shut down** the computer if you plan to install new hardware (don't forget to remove the battery and follow all the safety instructions in **Chapter 6**), plan to be away from the computer for several days, or you do not need it to wake up and run a scheduled task. Returning to full operation from **Shut down** takes longer than from **Sleep** or **Hibernate**.





Configuring the Power Buttons

The power/sleep button (Fn + F12 key combo) and closed lid may be set to send the computer in to a power-saving state. Click **Choose what the power buttons do** on the left menu in **Power Options** to bring up the menu.

Password Protection

It is recommended that you enable a password on wake up in order to protect your data.

However you can disable this setting from the **Power Options** menu by clicking **Require a password on wakeup** in the left menu, and selecting the options (click **Change settings that are currently unavailable**).

Adding Hibernate/Sleep to the Power Menu

Add Hibernate/Sleep to the Power Menu as follows.

- 1. Go to the **Power Options** (Hardware and Sound) control panel.




Figure 3 - 6 Power Options Define Power Buttons - Shutdown Settings

When the computer is on, you can use the power button as a Sleep/Hibernate/Shut Down hot key button when it is pressed for less than **4 seconds** (pressing and holding the power button for longer than this will force the computer to shut down).

Closing the Lid

If you have chosen to send the computer to **Sleep** when the lid is closed, raising the lid will wake the system up.

Power Conservation Modes

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The **Energy Star** setting will result in maximum power saving, but with the possible loss of some performance.

Setting the mode to **Balance** will give power saving matched with performance.

Performance will give optimum computer performance but with less power conservation.

Note that the Energy Star setting will put the display into sleep after no more than 15 minutes of user inactivity.

Power Conservation Modes

This system supports **Energy Star** power management features that place computers (CPU, hard drive, etc.) into a low-power sleep modes after a designated period of inactivity. Adjust **Power Conservation Modes** from the **Control Center**:

- 1. Press the Fn + Esc key combination to toggle the Control Center on/off.
- 2. Click either the Performance, Balanced or Energy Star button.

Ctrl + Alt + Delete Key Combination

You can use the **CTRL** + **ALT** + **DEL** key combination from almost any of the *Windows 8* interfaces/Apps to bring up a full-screen displaying **Lock**, **Switch User**, **Log off**, **Change a password** and **Task Manager** options. If you click the **Power** icon in the lower right corner of the screen a power management option menu appears to display **Sleep**, **Shut down**, and **Restart**.




Figure 3 - 8 Ctrl + Alt + Delete Menu

To fully control all the power options (including Hibernate mode) go to the **Power Options** control panel and configure the power button, sleep button and lid to perform the function selected.

Power Management



When the battery is critically low, immediately connect the AC/DC adapter to the computer or save your work, otherwise, the unsaved data will be lost when the power is depleted.

Battery Information

Follow these simple guidelines to get the best use out of your battery.

Battery Power




Figure 3 - 15 Power Options Advanced Settings -Intel® Dynamic Platform & Thermal Framework

Your computer's battery power is dependent upon many factors, including the programs you are running, and peripheral devices attached. You can set actions to be taken (e.g. Shut down, Hibernate etc.), and set critical and low battery levels from power plan **Change plan settings > Change advanced power settings** (see *Figure 3 - 3 on page 3 - 6*).

Click the battery icon **1** in the notification area to see the current battery level and charge status.

Conserving Battery Power

- Use a **power plan** that conserves power (e.g **Power saver**), however note that this may have an affect on computer performance.
- Lower the brightness level of the LCD display. The system will decrease LCD brightness slightly to save power when it is not powered by the AC/DC adapter.
- Reduce the amount of time before the display is turned off.
- Close wireless, Bluetooth, modem or communication applications when they are not being used.
- Disconnect/remove any unnecessary external devices e.g. USB devices, ExpressCards etc.

Power Management



Battery Removal

We recommend that you do not remove the battery yourself. If you do need to remove the battery for any reason (e.g. long term storage) for **Model B & C** computers see page **3** - **26** or page **3** - **27**.

Removing the embedded battery from **Model A** computers may violate the terms of the warranty. Contact your distributor/supplier for details

Battery Life

Battery life may be shortened through improper maintenance. To optimize the life and improve its performance, fully discharge and recharge the battery at least once every 30 days. It is recommended that you use the Battery Settings in the Energy Save Utility to help maintain the life of the battery.

New Battery

Always completely discharge, then fully charge, a new battery (see "*Battery FAQ*" *on page 3 - 18* for instructions on how to do this).

Recharging the Battery with the AC/DC Adapter

The battery pack automatically recharges when the AC/DC adapter is attached and plugged into an electrical outlet. If the computer is powered on, and in use, it will take several hours to fully recharge the battery. When the computer is turned off but plugged into an electrical outlet, battery charge time is less. Refer to "*LED Indicators*" on page 1 - 10 for information on the battery charge status, and to "*Battery Information*" on page 3 - 14 for more information on how to maintain and properly recharge the battery pack.

Proper handling of the Battery Pack

- DO NOT disassemble the battery pack under any circumstances
- DO NOT expose the battery to fire or high temperatures, it may explode
- DO NOT connect the metal terminals (+, -) to each other

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Damaged Battery Warning

Should you notice any physical defects (e.g. the battery is bent out of shape after being dropped), or any unusual smells emanating from the notebook battery, shut your computer down immediately and contact your distributor/supplier. If the battery has been dropped we do not recommend using it any further, as even if the computer continues to work with a damaged battery in place, it may cause circuit damage, which may possibly result in fire. It is recommended that you replace your computer battery every two years.

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Caution

Danger of explosion if battery is incorrectly replaced.

Replace only with the same or equivalent type recommended by the manufacturer. Discard used battery according to the manufacturer's instructions.



Battery FAQ

How do I completely discharge the battery?

Use the computer with battery power until it shuts down due to a low battery. Don't turn off the computer even if a message indicates the battery is critically low, just let the computer use up all of the battery power and shut down on its own.

- 1. Save and close all files and applications.
- 2. Create a power plan for discharging the battery and set all the options to Never.





Completely discharge and charge the battery at least once every 30 days or after about 20 partial discharges.

- **Config TDP Level** Sets the maximum power to be used by the processor. A **High TDP** level enables high performance, but needs more cooling and thus will reduce battery life. **Nominal TDP** operates the processor at the specified TDP and clock rate. **Low TDP** reduces the power and clock rate to extend the battery life, but may reduce system performance. This can be set independently for battery use, or for when plugged-in.
- **Power Limit** Sets the maximum power allowed for the processor. The higher values allow higher core voltage and operating clock rates, but this is at the cost of power consumption, heat and battery life.
- Acoustics Limit Sets the maximum fan speed. Higher values increase the speed for maximum cooling, and the lower values limit the speed for reduced fan noise. This can be set independently for battery use, or for when plugged-in.
- Low Power Mode Setting Enable this to place the processor into a special power saving mode when maximum battery life is needed.





Chapter 4: Drivers & Utilities

This chapter deals with installing the drivers and utilities essential to the operation or improvement of some of the computer's subsystems. The system takes advantage of some newer hardware components for which the latest versions of most available operating systems haven't built in drivers and utilities. Thus, some of the system components won't be auto-configured with an appropriate driver or utility during operating system installation. Instead, you need to manually install some system-required drivers and utilities.

What to Install

The *Device Drivers & Utilities + User's Manual* disc contains the drivers and utilities necessary for the proper operation of the computer. *Table 4 - 1, on page 4 - 3* lists what you need to install and **it is very important that the drivers are installed by the method outlined in this chapter, and in the order indicated**.

Note that the information included on the following pages is for *Windows 8.1 only*. For *Windows 10* driver installation see "*Windows 10 Drivers & Utilities*" on page E - 15.

Module Driver Installation

The procedures for installing drivers for the **Wireless LAN** and **Combination Blue-tooth & WLAN** modules are provided in *"Modules & Options" on page 6 - 1*.



Driver Installation & Power

When installing drivers make sure your computer is powered by the AC/DC adapter connected to a working power source. Some drivers draw a power during the installation procedure, and if capacity is not adequate this may cause the system to shut down and cause system problems (note that there is no safety issue involved here, and the battery will be rechargeable within 1

Drivers & Utilities

Driver Installation

- 1. Insert the *Device Drivers & Utilities* + *User's Manual* disc into the computer's DVD drive.
- 2. Click the message "Tap to choose what happens with this disc."
- 3. Click Run autorun.exe.
- 4. Click *Install Drivers* (button), or *Option Drivers* (button) to access the **Optional** driver menu.

Manual Driver Installation

Click *Browse CD/DVD* (button) in the *Drivers Installer* application and browse to the executable file in the appropriate driver folder.

Windows Update

After installing all the drivers make sure you enable **Windows Update** in order to get all the latest security updates etc. (all updates will include the latest **hotfixes** from Microsoft). See *"Windows Update" on page 4 -8* for instructions.

Updating/Reinstalling Individual Drivers

If you wish to update/reinstall individual drivers it may be necessary to uninstall the original driver. To do this go to the **Control Panel** in the *Windows OS* and double-click the **Programs and Features** icon (**Programs > Uninstall a program**). Click to select the driver (if it is not listed see below) and click **Uninstall**, and then follow the on screen prompts (it may be necessary to restart the computer). Reinstall the driver as outlined in this chapter.

If the driver is not listed in the **Programs and Fea**tures menu:

- 1. Go to the **Control Panel**).
- Double-click Device Manager (Hardware and Sound > Devices and Printers > Device Manager).
- 3. Double-click the **device** you wish to update/reinstall the driver for (you may need to click "+" to expand the selection).
- 4. Click **Driver** (tab) and click the **Update Driver** or **Uninstall** button and follow the on screen prompts.

User Account Control

If a **User Account Control** prompt appears as part of the driver installation procedure, click **Continue** or **Allow**, and follow the installation procedure as directed.

Windows Security Message

If you receive a *Windows* security message as part of the driver installation process. Just click "*Install this driver software anyway*" or "*Install*" to continue the installation procedure.

You will receive this message in cases where the driver has been released after the version of *Windows* you are currently using. All the drivers provided will have already received certification for *Windows*.

New Hardware Found

If you see the message "**New Hardware Found**" during the installation procedure (**other than when outlined in the driver install procedure**), click **Cancel** to close the window, and follow the installation procedure.



Driver Installation General Guidelines

The driver installation procedure outlined in this Chapter (and in **Chapter 6 Options & Modules**), are accurate at the time of going to press.

Drivers are always subject to upgrade and revision so the exact procedure for certain drivers may differ slightly. As a general guide follow the default on screen instructions for each driver (e.g. **Next > Next > Finish**) unless you are an advanced user. In many cases a restart is required to install the driver.

Make sure any modules (e.g. WLAN or Bluetooth) are **ON** before installing the appropriate driver.

Insert the *Device Drivers & Utilities + User's Manual disc* and click *Install Drivers* (button).

To install any of the optional drivers listed overleaf, eject the *Device Drivers & Utilities + User's Manual* disc and then reinsert it (or double-click the disc icon in **My Computer**), and click *Option Drivers* (button) to access the optional driver menu.

C/Windows Update

After installing all the drivers make sure you enable **Windows Update** in order to get all the latest security updates etc. (all updates will include the latest **hotfixes** from Microsoft).

To enable Windows Update make sure you are connected to the internet:

- 1. Go to the Control Panel.
- 2. Click Windows Update (System and Security/Security).
- 3. Click Check for updates (button).
- 4. The computer will now check for updates (you need to be connected to the internet).
- 5. Click **Install now** (button) to begin checking for the updates.
- 6. Click Install updates (button) to install the updates.

Chapter 5: BIOS Utilities

Overview

This chapter gives a brief introduction to the computer's built-in software:

If your computer has never been set up, or you are making important changes to the system (e.g. hard disk setup), then you should review this chapter first and note the original settings found in *Setup*. Even if you are a beginner, keep a record of the settings you find and any changes you make. This information could be useful if your system ever needs servicing.

There is one general rule: *Don't make any changes unless you are sure of what you are doing*. Many of the settings are required by the system, and changing them could cause it to become unstable or worse. If you have any doubts, consult your service representative.

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BIOS Screens

Note that the BIOS screens pictured on these pages are intended for guidance in setting up your system's BIOS.

BIOS versions are subject to constant change and revision, therefore your computer's actual screens may appear slightly different from those pictured on these pages.

BIOS Utilities



BIOS Settings Warning

Incorrect settings can cause your system to malfunction. To correct mistakes, return to *Setup* and restore the **Optimized Defaults** with **<F3>**.

UEFI Boot & POST

When UEFI Boot is enabled, then the prompts to **press F2 or F7 will not appear**. However you can still press F2 to enter the setup, or F7 to choose the preferred boot device, if you press the key immediately the system boots up.

The Setup Utility

Each time you turn on the computer the system takes a few seconds to conduct a **POST**, including a quick test of the on-board RAM (memory).

As the **POST** proceeds, the computer will tell you if there is anything wrong. If there is a problem that prevents the system from booting, it will display a system summary and prompt you to run *Setup*.

If there are no problems, the *Setup* prompt will disappear and the system will load the operating system. Once that starts, you can't get into *Setup* without rebooting.

The **Aptio Setup Utility** tells the system how to configure itself and manage basic features and subsystems (e.g. port configuration).

To enter *Setup*, turn on the computer and press **F2** (give the system a few seconds to enter *Setup*). If the **Boot Logo** is enabled the **F2** on screen will be **highlighted** to illustrate that the system is processing the request during the **POST** (or press **F7** for boot options). If you get a "Keyboard Error", (usually because you pressed **F2** too quickly) just press **F2** again.

If the computer is already on, reboot using the Ctrl + Alt + Delete combination and then hold down F2 when prompted. The *Setup* main menu will appear.

To see the boot options press F7 and choose your preferred boot device.

Failing the POST

Errors can be detected during the **POST**. There are two categories, "fatal" and "non-fatal".

Fatal Errors

These stop the boot process and usually indicate there is something seriously wrong with your system. Take the computer to your service representative or authorized distributor/supplier as soon as possible.

Non-Fatal Errors

This kind of error still allows you to boot. You will get a message identifying the problem (make a note of this message!) and you can then press **F7** (the **F7** on screen will be **highlighted** to illustrate that the system is processing the request) for boot options.

Press **F2** (give the system a few seconds to enter *Setup*; the **F2** on screen will be highlighted to illustrate that the system is processing the request) to run the **Setup** program and try to correct the problem. If you still get an error message after you change the setting, or if the "cure" seems even worse, call for help.

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

Setup Screens

The following pages contain additional advice on portions of the *Setup*. Along the top of the screen is a menu bar with menu headings. When you select a heading, a new screen appears. Scroll through the features listed on each screen to make changes to *Setup*.

Instructions on how to navigate each screen are in the box at the bottom right side of the screen.



If these tools are confusing, press **F1** to call up a **General Help** screen, and then use the arrow keys to scroll up or down the page.

The **Item Specific Help** on the upper right side of each screen explains the highlighted item and has useful messages about its options.

If you see an arrow \blacktriangleright next to an item, press **Enter** to go to a sub-menu on that subject. The sub-menu screen that appears has a similar layout, but the **Enter** key may execute a command.

System Time & Date (Main Menu)

The hour setting uses the 24-hour system (i.e., $\emptyset\emptyset$ = midnight; 13 = 1 pm). If you can change the date and time settings in your operating system, you will also change these settings. Some applications may also alter data files to reflect these changes.

BIOS Utilities

SATA Port # (Main Menu)

Pressing **Enter** opens the sub-menu to show the configuration of a optical Device/ HDD on the computer's SATA Ports.

System/Extended Memory: (Main Menu)

This item contains information on the system memory, and is not user configurable. The system will auto detect the amount of memory installed.

MB Series / BIOS Revision / KBC/EC firmware Revision / MAC Address This item contains information on the BIOS version, network adapter address etc., and is not user configurable.

Advanced Chipset Control (Advanced Menu)

The sub-menu here allows you to enable/disable the **FlexiCharger** (see page 5 - 9) and to enable/disable **Aggressive LPM Support**. Aggressive Link Power Management (ALPM) is a power management protocol for AHCI and SATA devices. This allows the SATA host bus adapter to enter a low-power state during periods of inactivity when enabled.

UEFI Boot

When UEFI Boot is enabled, then the prompts to press F2 or F7 will not appear. However you can still press F2 to enter the setup, or F7 to choose the preferred boot device, if you press the key immediately the system boots up.

SATA Mode (Advanced Menu)

The SATA (Serial ATA) control is configured to operate in **AHCI** (Advanced Host Controller Interface) mode.

Boot Logo (Advanced Menu)

Use this menu item to enable/disable the **Boot Logo** screen at system startup **if you have not enabled UEFI Boot**. If you disable the **Boot Logo** you will not see the **F2 Enter Setup** or **F7 Boot Options** prompts on the screen, however you can still press these keys, while the boot screen is displayed, to perform the Enter Setup or Boot Option functions.

Power On Boot Beep (Advanced Menu)

Use this menu item to enable/disable the beep as the computer starts up.


Battery Low Alarm Beep (Advanced Menu)

Use this menu item to enable/disable the battery low alarm beep.

FlexiCharger Enable (Advanced Menu > Advanced Chipset Control) The sub-menu here allows you to enable/disable the **FlexiCharger**. The Battery Engine may be set to automatically start charging your battery when the battery reaches a certain capacity level (e.g. you could start the battery charge level at 40%).

You can then set the level to stop charging (e.g. 100%), and of course this stop charge level must be higher then the start charge level.

See the sidebar warning for information on running the FlexiCharger for an extended period as this is not recommended.






If you leave the FlexiCharger continuously "Enabled" for a period of three months or more, the battery meter's reading accuracy will deteriorate.

To reset this, set the FlexiCharger to "**Disabled**", and then allow the battery to completely discharge (see "**Battery FAQ**" on page 3 - 18) before enabling the function again.


Security Menu



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The changes you make here affect the access to the **Setup** utility itself, and also access to your machine as it boots up after you turn it on. These settings do not affect your machine or network passwords which will be set in your software OS.

Set Supervisor Password (Security Menu)

You can set a password for access to the **Aptio Setup Utility**. This will not affect access to the computer OS (only the **Aptio Setup Utility**).

BIOS Utilities

Note: To clear existing passwords press **Enter** and type the existing password, then press **Enter** for the new password (without typing any password entry) and **Enter** again to confirm the password clearance.

Set User Password (Security Menu)

You can set a password for user mode access to the **Aptio Setup Utility**. This will not affect access to the computer OS, (only the *Setup* utility) unless you choose to set a *Password on Boot* (see below). Many menu items in the **Aptio Setup Utility** cannot be modified in user mode.

Note: You can only set the user password after you have set the supervisor password.

Password on boot: (Security Menu)

Specify whether or not a password should be entered to boot the computer (you may only set a password on boot if a supervisor password is enabled). If "*Enabled*" is selected, only users who enter a correct password can boot the system (see the warning in the sidebar). The default setting is "*Disabled*".

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Password Warning

If you set a boot password (Password on boot is "Enabled"), **NEVER** forget your password.

The consequences of this could be serious. If you cannot remember your boot password you must contact your vendor and you may lose all of the information on your hard disk.

Secure Boot Control (Security Menu)

Secure Boot prevents unauthorized operating systems and software from loading during the startup process. **Secure Boot** is available as a menu option if you have **enabled UEFI Boot** (see "*UEFI Boot (Boot Menu*)" *on page 5 - 15*). Enabling Secure Boot will bring up the **Secure Boot Mode** menu to enable you to configure Secure Boot as **Standard** (with a fixed secure boot policy) or **Custom** (which enables you to make changes to the **Key Management** database if required).

Boot Option Priorities (Boot Menu)

Press Enter to access the menu, use the arrow keys to move up and down the menu, and press Enter to select a device from the **Boot Option #** list (the selected device will be highlighted in white).

UEFI Boot (Boot Menu)

Enable/disable UEFI Boot from this menu. The Unified Extensible Firmware Interface (UEFI) specification provides a clean interface between operating systems and platform firmware at boot time. In contrast to BIOS, UEFI defines a set of standard boot and runtime services. The *Network Stack* and *Launch CSM (Compatibility Support Module* - for legacy BIOS compatibility) items will be enabled as options under UEFI Boot.

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Wireless Device Operation Aboard Aircraft

The use of any portable electronic transmission devices aboard aircraft is usually prohibited. Make sure the WLAN & Bluetooth module(s) are OFF (or the system is in Airplane Mode) if you are using the computer aboard aircraft (see Table 1 - 4, on page 1 - 14).

PC Camera Module

When the PC Camera application is run the LED indicator to the left of the camera will be illuminated (see **2** *Figure 1 - 2 on page 1 - 7*). Note that you need to use the **Camera** app in *Windows* to take pictures and capture video. **Use the Fn + F10 key combination** (see *"Function/Hot Key Indicators" on page 1 - 14*) to toggle power to the PC Camera module.

PC Camera Audio Setup

If you want to capture video & **audio** with your camera, it is necessary to setup the audio recording options in *Windows*.

- 1. Go to the Control Panel.
- 2. Click Sound (Hardware and Sound) and click Recording (tab).
- 3. Right-click hold and release **Microphone** (Realtek High Definition Audio) and make sure the item is not disabled.
- 4. Double-click Microphone (or select Properties from the right-click menu).
- 5. Click Levels (tab), and adjust the Microphone and Microphone Boost sliders to the level required.
- 6. Click **OK** and close the control panels.



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Camera App

- 1. Run the **Camera** app from the Start screen by clicking on the **Camera** app icon
- 2. The camera interface will display two buttons on the right side of the screen.






- 3. The upper button is used to record video, and the lower button is used to take still pictures.
- 4. **Right-click** on the screen to bring up menu buttons at the bottom of the screen.
- 5. These buttons enable you to access the **camera roll** (where captured pictures and video are displayed), set the **timer** (the time period before capture begins; 3 seconds, 10 seconds or Off) and set the exposure level using the slider to obtain the best results.




Camera Options

The Camera Options settings may be accessed as follows:

- 1. Run the **Camera** app from the **Start** screen by clicking on the **Camera** app icon
- While the camera app is running access the Charms Bar (e.g. click Use the Windows logo key # + C key combination).
- 3. Click Settings and then click Options.
- 4. You can adjust the **Photo Aspect Ratio**, select the **Microphone**, **Hide/Show** grid lines and turn Location Info on or off from the **Options** panel.





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Taking Pictures/Capturing Video

- 1. Run the **Camera** app from the **Start** screen by clicking on the **Camera** app icon
- 2. Right-click the screen and select the timer if you require a countdown before capture.
- 3. Click the appropriate icon to take a picture or start video capture (if video capture begins a timer will appear in the bottom corner of the screen).
- 4. To stop video capture click the main window again (or click the stop icon .).
- 5. Captured photos and videos will be saved to a **Camera Roll** folder within the **Pictures** folder.




Figure 6 - 5 **Pictures - Camera Roll**

Camera Roll

Editing Photos

1. Clicking on a captured photo will bring up an app bar with a series of buttons.



- 7. Click **Rotate** to rotate the picture through 90 degrees.
- 8. Use the handles to **Crop** any captured picture, and click **Apply** to make the changes (you can change the **Aspect** ratio by clicking the button and selecting an aspect ratio from the menu). You can **Save a copy** (create another copy of the

photo with the edited changes), **Update original** (which changes the original picture permanently) or **Undo** any changes.

- 9. Click the Edit button to bring up a full suite of tools to edit the photo.

 After the editing process is completed right-click on the photo to Save a copy (create another copy of the photo with the edited changes), Update original (which changes the original picture permanently), Undo any changes or Cancel the editing.

Editing Photos

Video File Size

Note that capturing high resolution video files requires a substantial amount of disk space for each file. After recording video, check the video file size (right-click the file and select **Properties**) and the remaining free space on your hard disk (go to **My Computer**, right-click the hard disk, and select **Properties**). If necessary you can remove the recorded video file to a removable medium e.g. CD, DVD or USB Flash drive.

Note that the *Windows 8.1* system requires a minimum of **16GB** (**32-bit**) or **20GB** (**64-bit**) of free space on the **C: drive** system partition. In order to prevent system problems it is recommended that you move any large sized captured video file to a location other than the **C: drive**.

Wireless LAN Module

If you have included an **Intel**® or **3rd Party WLAN** module in your purchase option make sure that the module is on (i.e. the system is not in **Airplane Mode**) before installing the driver.

Make sure you install the drivers in the order indicated in *Table 4 - 1, on page 4 - 3*.

Note that you need to install both the WLAN & Bluetooth drivers for the WLAN & Bluetooth Combo modules.

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Wireless Device Operation Aboard Aircraft










High Speed Bluetooth Data Transfer

The Combination Wireless LAN & Bluetooth module supports high speed data transfer. However to achieve such transfer speeds, both devices must support high speed data transfer.

To obtain high speed data transfer make sure that both the WLAN and Bluetooth modules are powered on.

Check your Bluetooth compatible device's documentation to confirm it supports high speed data transfer.




Figure 6 - 13 Bluetooth Taskbar Icon & Change PC Settings (Charms Bar -Settings)



3G/4G Module

If you have included an **optional UMTS/HSPA+** based 3G Module (Universal Mobile Telecommunications System or High Speed Packet Access) module or **LTE** (Long Term Evolution) 4G module (see "*Communication*" on page *D* - 3 for specification details) in your purchase option, you do not require a driver/application installation for Windows. Follow the instructions overleaf to install the USIM card (which will be supplied by your service provider) for **Model B** computers (installing the USIM card for **Model A** computers will require assistance from your distributor/ supplier - see page 6 - 23), and then **use the Charms Bar Wireless icon to access the 3G/4G network** in the same manner as the WLAN.

Important Notice

If your purchase option includes both Wireless LAN and 3G/4G modules, then the appropriate antennas will be installed. Note that In order to comply with FCC RF exposure compliance requirements, the antenna must not be co-located or operate in conjunction with any other antenna or transmitter.

Important Notice - 3G/4G & Bluetooth/Wireless LAN Modules

In order to comply with FCC regulations you should NOT operate the 3G/4G module and the Bluetooth/Wireless LAN modules at the same time as this may disrupt radio frequency, and cause interference. 

- 1. Turn the computer off, and turn it over.
- 2. Slide the latch (1) in the direction of the arrow.
- 3. Slide the latch 2 in the direction of the arrow, and hold it in place.
- 4. Slide the battery out in the direction of the arrow **3**.
- 5. Insert the USIM card (4) as illustrated below until it clicks fully into position, and replace the battery.

Contact your distributor/supplier for assistance on installing the USIM card for **Model A** computers, as removing the bottom cover of the computer can void your warranty.


Figure 6 - 18 Networks Mobile Broadband

3G/4G Configuration in Windows

You can configure a 3G/4G connection as below, however make sure the system is not in Airplane Mode before configuration begins.

Charms Bar

- 1. Go to the Charms Bar.
- 2. Select **Settings** and then click the **WiFi icon** (it should read **Available** under the icon and **Airplane mode** should be **Off**).
- 3. A list of available access points will appear under Mobile Broadband.





Figure 6 - 19 Mobile Broadband (Connect)

Trusted Platform Module

(Optional)

The **TPM security chip** allows you to create and manage digital certificates for user and platform authentication. This type of security is usually administered within large enterprises and organizations, and therefore requires implementation by a system administrator before users can access security features.


Make sure you have administrator's rights to your computer, and have a *Windows* password enabled for full security protection. In addition **Make sure you prepare** a removable media (e.g. a USB flash drive) to store passwords etc. before beginning the TPM initialization process.

Before setting up the TPM functions you must enable and initialize the security platform. 6

Enabling & Activating TPM

- 1. Restart the computer.
- 2. Enter the Aptio Setup Utility pressing F2 during the POST/startup.
- 3. Use the arrow keys to select the **Security** menu.
- 4. Select **TPM Configuration** and press Enter to access the sub-menu.
- 5. Select Enable in Security Device Support.
- 6. You will then need to press F4 to save the changes and restart the computer.




Figure 6 - 22 BitLocker Drive Encryption (TPM Administration) 4. The TPM Management window allows you to configure the TPM within *Windows*. As TPM is usually administered within large enterprises and organizations, your system administrator will need to assist you in managing the information here.




Figure 6 - 23 Trusted Platform Module (TPM) Management on Local Computer Administration

TPM Actions

BitLocker

BitLocker Drive Encryption can be used in conjunction with the TPM to encrypt data on the disk. Access the Microsoft **BitLocker Drive Encryption** control panel applet from the *Windows* control panel (**System and Security**).

- 1. Click Turn on Bit Locker.
- 2. Follow the on-screen instructions to setup BitLocker, and make sure you have a removable media (e.g. a USB flash drive) to store saved recovery keys etc.




Figure 6 - 25 BitLocker Drive Encryption

Wireless Display

Wireless Display uses your Wireless LAN module/WLAN Bluetooth Combo module (you need to make sure that your video adapter/display device is compatible with your particular WLAN/Combo module) in conjunction with a compatible video adapter/display device (purchased separately) to allow you to display the contents of the notebook display on another display (e.g. HDTV), without the need to have cables stretching across a room.

You can use the wireless display to play games, browse the internet, display videos or photo slide shows on your TV/external display without using HDMI or A/V cables.

Before configuring **Wireless Display** you will need to set up your **compatible adapter** with your display/speakers. Connect the adapter using an HDMI or A/V cable and turn on the display (or in the case of speakers connect them to the wireless speaker adapter with the cables provided with the adapter), and then set the display to the appropriate input channel (see the documentation supplied with your **compatible adapter/display** for full details).

Note that no driver or application is required for wireless display in *Windows 8.1*.



For a list of compatible adapters check the video adapter/display device documentation, or with your distributor/ supplier.

Modules & Options

Wireless Display Configuration

- 1. Note that no driver or application is required for wireless display in *Windows 8.1*.
- 2. Go the Charms Bar, select Devices.
- 3. Click Project.
- 4. Click Add a wireless display.




Figure 6 - 26 Add a Wireless Display 5. The system will then search for compatible display devices (**this may take up to 60 seconds** so allow time for this to complete).



Chapter 7: Troubleshooting

Overview

Should you have any problems with your computer, before consulting your service representative, you may want to try to solve the problem yourself. This chapter lists some common problems and their possible solutions. This can't anticipate every problem, but you should check here before you panic. If you don't find the answer in these pages, make sure you have followed the instructions carefully and observed the safety precautions in the preface. If all else fails, talk to your service representative. You should also make a record of what happened and what remedies you tried.

Of course, if something goes wrong, it will happen at the most inconvenient time possible, so you should preview this section just in case. If, after you've tried everything, and the system still won't cooperate, try turning it off for a few minutes and then rebooting. You will lose any unsaved data, but it may start working again. Then call your service representative.

Basic Hints and Tips

Many of the following may seem obvious but they are often the solution to a problem when your computer appears not to be working.

- Power Is the computer actually plugged into a working electrical outlet? If plugged into a power strip, make sure it is actually working. Check the LED Power & Communication Indicators (see "LCD Panel Open Model A" on page 1 7 & "LCD Panel Open Model B" on page 1 8) to see the computer's power status.
- Connections Check all the cables to make sure that there are no loose connections anywhere.
- Power Savings Make sure that the system is not in Hibernate or Sleep mode by pressing the keys configured in your Power Options (see "Power-Saving States" on page 3 7), the Fn + F12 key combination, or power button to wake-up the system.
- **Brightness** Check the brightness of the screen by pressing the **Fn** + **F8** and **F9** keys to adjust the brightness.
- Display Choice Press Fn + F7 to make sure the system is not set to "external only" display.
- Boot Drive Make sure there are no optical media and/or USB storage devices in any connected drive.

Backup and General Maintenance

- Always **backup** your important data, and keep copies of your OS and programs safe, but close to hand. Don't forget to note the **serial numbers** if you are storing them out of their original cases, e.g. in a CD wallet.
- Run **maintenance programs** on your hard disk and OS as often as you can. You may schedule these programs to run at times when you are not using your computer. You can use those that are provided free with your OS, or buy the more powerful dedicated programs to do so.
- Write down your passwords and keep them safe (away from your computer). This is especially important if you choose to use a **Supervisor** password for the BIOS (see *"The Setup Utility" on page 5 2*).
- Keep copies of vital settings files such as network, dialup settings, mail settings etc.(even if just brief notes).

Warranty

The CPU is not a user serviceable part. Opening this compartment, or accessing the CPU in any way, may violate your warranty.

Viruses

- Install an **Anti-Virus** program and keep the **definitions file** (the file which tells your program which viruses to look for) up to date. New computer viruses are discovered daily, and some of them may seriously harm your computer and cause you to lose data. **Anti-Virus** programs are commercially available and the **defini-tions file updates** are usually downloadable directly from the internet.
- Be careful when opening e-mail from sources you don't know. **Viruses** are often triggered from within **e-mail attachments** so take care when opening any attached file. You can configure most **Anti-Virus** programs to check all **e-mail attachments**. **Note**: You should also beware of files from people you know as the virus may have infected an **address book** and been automatically forwarded without the person's knowl-edge.
- Keep a "Bootable CD-ROM/DVD-ROM/USB storage device" (this CD/DVD/USB device provides basic information which allows you to startup your computer) handy. You may refer to your OS's documentation for instructions on how to make one, and many Anti-Virus programs will also provide such a disk (or at least instructions on how to make one).

Upgrading and Adding New Hardware/Software

- Do not be tempted to make changes to your **Windows Registry** unless you are very sure of what you are doing, otherwise you will risk severely damaging your system.
- Don't open your computer or undertake any repair or upgrade work if you are not comfortable with what you are doing.
- Read the **documentation**. We can assume, since you are reading this that you are looking at the computer's manual, but what about any new peripheral devices you have just purchased? Many problems are caused by the installation of new hardware and/or software. Always refer to the documentation of any new hardware and/or software, and pay particular attention to files entitled "**READ ME**" or "**READ ME FIRST**".
- When installing a new device always make sure the device is powered on, and in many cases you will need to restart the computer. Always check that all the cables are correctly connected.
- Make sure you have installed the **drivers** for any new hardware you have installed (latest **driver files** are usually available to download from vendor's websites).

- Thoroughly check any **recent changes** you made to your system as these changes may affect one or more system components, or software programs. If possible, go back and undo the change you just made and see if the problem still occurs.
- Don't over complicate things. The less you have to deal with then the easier the source of the problem may be found; **Example** if your computer has many devices plugged into its ports, and a number of programs running, then it will be difficult to determine the cause of a problem. Try disconnecting all of the devices and restarting the computer with all the peripheral devices unplugged. A process of elimination (adding and removing devices and restarting where necessary) will often find the source of a problem, although this may be time consuming.

Problems and Possible Solutions

Problem	Possible Cause - Solution
You turned on the power but it doesn't work.	Battery missing / incorrectly installed. Check the battery bay, make sure the battery is present and seated properly (the design of the battery only allows it to go in one way). Make sure there's nothing interfering with the battery contacts.
The battery LED power indicator []], is blinking orange.	Low Battery. Plug in the DC power source. If the computer doesn't start up immediately, turn it off then on again.
You are losing battery power too quickly.	The system is using too much power. If your OS has a Power Options scheme (see "Power Plans" on page 3 - 5) check its settings. You may also be using a peripheral device/USB device that is drawing a lot of power.
Actual battery operating time is shorter than expected.	The battery has not been fully discharged before being recharged. Make sure the battery is fully discharged and recharge it completely before reusing (see pages 3 - 14 to 3 - 21).
	<i>Power Options have been disabled.</i> Go to the Control Panel in <i>Windows</i> and re-enable the options.
	A peripheral device/USB device is consuming a lot of power. Turn off/remove the unused device to save power.

Problem	Possible Cause - Solution
The computer feels too hot.	Make sure the computer is properly ventilated and the Vent/Fan intakes are not blocked. If this doesn't cool it down, put the system into Hibernate mode or turn it off for an hour. Make sure the computer isn't sitting on a thermal surface (see "Overheating" on page 1 - 23). Make sure you're using the correct adapter.
	Make sure that your notebook is completely powered off before putting it into a travel bag (or any such container). Putting a notebook which is powered on in a travel bag may cause the Vent/Fan intakes to be blocked.
Nothing appears on screen.	The system is in a power saving mode. Toggle the sleep/resume key combination, Fn + F4 (see "Configuring the Power Buttons" on page 3 - 9).
	The screen controls need to be adjusted. Toggle the screen control key combinations $Fn + F8/F9$. If you're connected to an external monitor, make sure it's plugged in and turned on. You should also check the monitor's own brightness and contrast controls.
	The computer is set for a different display. Toggle the screen display key combination, Fn + F7 . If an external monitor is connected, turn it on.
	The screen saver is activated. Press any key or touch the TouchPad.
No image appears on the external monitor I have plugged in and powered on.	You haven't installed the video driver and configured it appropriately from the Control Panel . See Appendix C for instructions on installing and configuring the video driver.

Problem	Possible Cause - Solution
You forget the boot password .	If you forget the password, you may have to discharge the battery of the CMOS. Contact your service representative for help.
	アassword Warning
	ER forget your password. The consequences of this could be serious. If you cannot ontact your vendor and you may lose all of the information on your hard disk.
The sound cannot be heard or the volume is very low .	The volume might be set too low. Check the volume control in the Volume Control Panel in the Windows notification area, or use the key combination Fn + F5 and F6 (see "Function/Hot Key Indicators" on page 1 - 14) to adjust.
My internal microphone seems to be disabled and/or I can still hear sound from the speakers even though I have plugged headphones into the headphone jack.	You have disabled "Front panel jack detection" in Connector Settings in the Realtek HD Audio Manager control panel. Go to the Realtek HD Audio Manager and click the Connector Settings icon and make sure that there is no tick alongside "Front panel jack detection" and click OK.
The CD/DVD cannot be read.	The CD/DVD is dirty. Clean it with a CD/DVD cleaner kit.
The CD/DVD tray will not open when there is a disc in the tray.	The CD/DVD is not correctly placed in the tray. Gently try to remove the disc using the eject hole (see "Loading Discs" on page 2 - 3).

Problem	Possible Cause - Solution
The DVD regional codes can no longer be changed.	The code has been changed the maximum 5 times. See "DVD Regional Codes" on page 2 - 5.
Unwelcome numbers appear when typing.	Num Lock is turned ON (see "Function/Hot Key Indicators" on page 1 - 14).
I am sliding my finger up and down on the right side of the Touchpad to scroll a Window and the Touchpad does not respond .	There are different Touchpad versions available on this computer, and this version requires tapping/holding to scroll. Either tap repeatedly, or hold the finger down, at the top or bottom right of the Touchpad (depending on the scrolling direction required) to scroll the window.

Other Keyboards

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If your keyboard is damaged or you just want to make a change, you can use any standard USB keyboard. The system will detect and enable it automatically. However special functions/hot keys unique to the system's regular keyboard may not work.

7 - 10 Problems and Possible Solutions

Problem	Possible Cause - Solution
The system never goes into a power saving mode.	Power Options features are not enabled. Go to the <i>Windows</i> Power Options menu and enable the features you prefer (see <i>"Power-Saving States" on page 3 - 7</i>). Make sure you have enabled Hibernate mode from the control panel.
The Wireless LAN/Bluetooth modules cannot be detected.	<i>The modules are off as the computer is in</i> Airplane Mode . Go to the Charms Bar and select Settings and then click the WiFi icon (Airplane mode should be Off).
The PC Camera module cannot be detected.	<i>The module is off.</i> Press the Fn + F10 key combination in order to enable the module (see <i>"Function/Hot Key Indicators" on page 1 - 14</i>). Run the camera application to view the camera picture.
The Wireless LAN/Bluetooth modules cannot be configured.	The driver(s) for the module(s) have not been installed. Make sure you have installed the driver for the appropriate module (see the instructions for the appropriate module in <i>"Modules & Options" on page 6 - 1</i>).
A file cannot be copied to/from a connected Bluetooth device.	The transfer of data between the computer and a Bluetooth enabled device is supported in one direction only (simultaneous data transfer is not supported). If you are copying a file from your computer to a Bluetooth enabled device, you will not be able to copy a file from the Bluetooth enabled device to your computer until the file transfer process has been completed

Problem	Possible Cause - Solution
I cannot obtain high speed Bluetooth data transfer.	 To obtain high speed Bluetooth data transfer take into account the following: To achieve high speed transfer speeds, both devices must support high speed data transfer (i.e both the computer and the Bluetooth compatible device you are connecting to). Check your Bluetooth compatible device's documentation to confirm it supports high speed data transfer, and for configuration information.

Problem	Possible Cause - Solution
I have used Update Driver in Device Manager (Unknown device > Other Devices) to try and install the Airplane Mode driver. <i>Windows</i> encountered a problem in attempting to update the driver, and a yellow exclamation mark appears in Device Manager against the Unknown device.	 It is very important that the drivers are installed in the order indicated in Chapter 4 (which is the numbered installation order on the Device Drivers & Utilities + User's Manual disc). This issue can occur when drivers are manually installed, and not in the correct order. If you have attempted to Update Driver from the Device Manager control panel and have encountered problems, then use the method below to correct this: To correct this problem: 1. Go to the Programs and Features (Programs) control panel in <i>Windows</i>. 2. Select any installed Airplane Mode driver item (e.g. Insyde Airplane Mode HID Mini-Driver), and click Uninstall/Change to uninstall the current driver. 3. Restart the computer. 4. Insert the Device Drivers & Utilities + User's Manual disc and click Install Drivers (button). 5. Double-click the Airplane Driver item in the menu. 6. Follow the instructions to install the correct driver (you will need to restart the computer as part of the installation process).

Problem	Possible Cause - Solution
When using a Bluetooth headset the audio appears to be mono and not stereo.	This is a common issue with Bluetooth headsets. To resolve this issue do the following (you will need to repeat this procedure after every boot up , restart , or when the system resumes from hibernation):
	 Go to the Devices & Printers control panel in Windows. Double-click the Bluetooth headset. Click Connect to complete the stereo connection.
	 Go to the Sound control panel in <i>Windows</i>. Right-click (in the Playback tab) the Bluetooth Stereo Audio device (the default device is Headset). Click Connect to complete the stereo connection.

3G/4G Module PIN Code & Power-Saving

Note that there may be some issues when a PIN Code is set for a 3G/4G module (if you are unsure of your module version contact your distributor/supplier) in *Windows*, if Mobile Broadband has been turned off, and the system has resumed from a power-saving state. **To prevent any issues it is recommended that you simply do not enable a PIN for a 3G/4G module**. The following provides instructions for disabling the PIN code.

Disabling a PIN code for a 3G/4G Module

- 1. Go to the Charms Bar.
- 2. Click Change PC Settings.




Figure 7 - 1 - Change PC Settings




Figure 7 - 2 - Disable PIN

7 - 16 3G/4G Module PIN Code & Power-Saving

Resolving the "Insert a SIM" issue with the 3G/4G Module (Windows 8.1)

- 1. If a PIN was set for the 3G/4G module, you have then switched **Mobile broadband off** (or put the system in **Airplane Mode**) in **Networks**, and the system has just resumed from a power-saving state the following error may occur.
- 2. On resuming from the power-saving state the standard procedure would be to go to **Networks** in the **Charms Bar** and turn on Mobile broadband.
- 3. Go to the Charms Bar.
- 4. Select **Settings** and you will then note that the **WiFi icon** will read **Unavailable**.
- 5. Standard procedure would be to click the connection and enter the PIN number to unlock the connection.
- 6. In this instance you will note that the **Mobile broadband** connection will read **Insert a SIM**.
- 7. In this case you will need to restart the computer.
- 8. After system restart you can then connect to the Mobile Broadband as normal.
- 9. To fully resolve this issue it is recommended that you do not Enable a PIN a 3G/4G module.

Appendix A: Interface (Ports & Jacks) Overview

The following chapter will give a quick description of the interface (ports & jacks) which allow your computer to communicate with external devices, connect to the internet etc.

	The HDMI-Out (High-Definition Multimedia Interface) is an audio/video connector interface for transmitting uncompressed digital streams. This allows you to connect an external monitor, TV or Flat Panel Display etc. as a display device by means of a HDMI cable. Note that HDMI carries both audio and video signals .

ltem	Description
Headphone-Out Jack	Headphones or speakers may be connected through this jack. Note : Set your system's volume to a reduced level before connecting to this jack.
Microphone-In Jack	Plug an external microphone in to this jack to record on your computer.
RJ-45 LAN Jack	This port supports LAN (Network) functions. Note: Broadband (e.g. ADSL) modems usually connect to the LAN port.
Security Lock Slot	To prevent possible theft, a Kensington-type lock can be attached to this slot. Locks can be purchased at any computer store.
USB 2.0/1.1 Port USB 3.0 Port	USB 2.0 compatible ports (USB 2.0 is fully USB 1.1 compliant) are for low-speed peripherals such as keyboards, mice or scanners, and for high-speed peripherals such as external HDDs, digital video cameras or high-speed scanners etc. Devices can be plugged into the computer, and unplugged from the computer, without the need to turn the system off (if the power rating of your USB device is 500mA or above, make sure you use the power supply which comes with the device).
	The USB 3.0 ports are denoted by their blue color; and USB 2.0 ports are colored black. USB 3.0 will transfer data much faster than USB 2.0, and is backwards-compatible with USB 2.0.
	Note that Model A computers have one USB 2.0 port, but Model B & C computers have two USB 2.0 ports.

Appendix B: Control Center Overview

The following chapter will give a quick description of the functions of the **Control Center**. The **Control Center** gives quick access to frequently used controls, power management features and enables you to quickly turn modules on/off. Click the **Control Center** icons to toggle the appropriate function, or hold the mouse button down and move the dial control where applicable. Certain functions will automatically be adjusted when a power mode is selected. The **Control Center** in *Windows 8.1* works under the **Desktop** App and not under the Start screen.






Figure C - 2 Intel® HD Graphics Control Panel






Figure C - 13 Intel® HD Graphics Control Panel Video Image Scaling







Figure C - 20 Sound - HDMI Device (set Default)

Appendix E: Windows 10

Overview

This Appendix contains information (including control panel information, driver installation etc.) for users of the *Windows 10 OS*.

You can refer to the main manual for details of audio & video information, BIOS, modules etc. However drivers information specific to *Windows 10* will be included in this Appendix, as well as details on how to navigate the *Windows 10* user interface to access the applications, control panels, taskbar etc. Note that *Windows 10* will be subject to constant updates and revisions, and some of the screens pictured throughout this chapter may change over the course of time and appear differently from those illustrated.

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Windows 10 OS

In order to run Windows 10 64 bit) your computer requires a minimum 2GB of system memory (RAM).

Most of the apps, control panels, utilities and programs within *Windows 10* can be accessed from the **Start Menu** by clicking the icon **II** in the taskbar in the lower left corner of the screen (or by pressing the **Windows Logo Key II** on the keyboard).





Figure E - 2 - Right-Click Windows Logo in Start Menu





Figure E - 5 - Windows 10 Control Panel Access




Figure E - 7 - Taskbar






Figure E - 9 - Screen Resolution





- 4. Click in the check box to agree to the End User License Agreement and click Install.
- 5. Click Finish (click Yes if required to restart).
- 6. The operating system is the default setting for Wireless LAN control in *Windows 10*.
- 7. Click the Wireless icon in the notification area of the taskbar and double-click an access point to connect to it (or click it and click **Connect**).

Bluetooth & WLAN Combo Module

If your purchase option includes the **Combination Wireless LAN & Bluetooth module** (either Intel® or 3rd **Party**) then install the driver as instructed overleaf (two drivers are provided for the 3rd party WLAN module and one for the Intel WLAN module). - 6. Select the setup type (**Typical** is recommended) and click **Install**.

Bluetooth Configuration

- 1. Click the Settings item in the Start Menu and then click Devices.
- 2. Click Bluetooth and make sure Bluetooth is On and a list of discovered devices will appear.
- 3. Double-click the device you want to pair with the computer and click Pair.
- 4. On first connection the computer will provide you with a pairing code to be entered onto the device.
- 5. Enter the code into your Bluetooth enabled device and click Yes on the computer to complete the pairing.
- 6. Select a device and click **Remove Device** to disconnect from any device.
- 7. Click More Bluetooth Options, and make sure that *Allow Bluetooth devices to find this computer* check box (**Discovery**) has a check inside it.
- 8. Make sure that the *Alert me when a new Bluetooth device wants to connect* check box (**Connections**) has a check inside it, if you want to be notified when a Bluetooth device wants to connect.

PC Camera

Use the Fn + F10 key combination or **Control Center button** to toggle power to the PC Camera module. When the PC Camera is in use the LED indicator to the left of the camera will be illuminated.

Note that you need to use the **Camera app** in *Windows* to take pictures and capture video.

- 1. Make sure the PC Camera is turned on by using the **Fn + F10** key combination (or **Control Center button**).

3G/4G Module

If you have included an **optional UMTS/HSPA**+ based 3G Module (Universal Mobile Telecommunications System or High Speed Packet Access) module or **LTE** (Long Term Evolution) 4G module (see "*Communica-tion*" on page D - 3 for specification details) in your purchase option, you do not require a driver/application installation for Windows 10. See "3G/4G Module USIM Card Installation for Model B Computers" on page 6 - 22/"3G/4G Module USIM Card Installation for Model Card Installation on in-stalling the USIM card (which will be provided by your service provider). See overleaf for connection information.

Important Notice

If your purchase option includes both Wireless LAN and 3G/4G modules, then the appropriate antennas will be installed. Note that In order to comply with FCC RF exposure compliance requirements, the antenna must not be co-located or operate in conjunction with any other antenna or transmitter.

Important Notice - 3G/4G & Bluetooth/Wireless LAN Modules

In order to comply with FCC regulations you should NOT operate the 3G/4G module and the Bluetooth/Wireless LAN modules at the same time as this may disrupt radio frequency, and cause interference. When the 3G/4G module is powered on, make sure that the Bluetooth/Wireless LAN modules are powered off.

3G/4G Configuration in Windows 10

You can configure a 3G/4G connection as below, however make sure the system is not in Airplane Mode before configuration begins.

- 1. Click the Settings item in the Start Menu and then click Network and Internet.
- 2. Click Cellular a list of available access points will appear.
- 3. Click the access point and click Connect.
- 4. The system will connect to your network.
- 5. Connected will appear under the connection.
- 6. You can then access the internet, download e-mail etc. as per any internet connection.
- 7. To disconnect you can select the connection and click Disconnect.
- 8. You need to use Airplane Mode aboard aircraft.
- 9. You can also click the Wireless icon **m** in the notification area of the taskbar, click **Cellular** and double-click an access point connect to access the connection information.

Trusted Platform Module

(Optional)

The **TPM security chip** allows you to create and manage digital certificates for user and platform authentication. This type of security is usually administered within large enterprises and organizations, and therefore requires implementation by a system administrator before users can access security features.

Make sure you have administrator's rights to your computer, and have a *Windows* password enabled for full security protection. In addition Make sure you prepare a removable media (e.g. a USB flash drive) to store passwords etc. before beginning the TPM initialization process.

Before setting up the TPM functions you must enable and initialize the security platform (see "*Enabling & Ac-tivating TPM*" on page 6 - 28).

TPM Management in Windows

- 1. Go to the **Control Panel**.
- 2. Click BitLocker Drive Encryption (System and Security).
- 3. Click TPM Administration.
- 4. The TPM Management window allows you to configure the TPM within *Windows*. As TPM is usually administered within large enterprises and organizations, your system administrator will need to assist you in managing the information here.
- 5. Click **Prepare the TPM** and follow the instructions in the Wizard **to** prepare the TPM (this will probably require a restart of the computer and confirmation of the setting changes after restart by pressing the appropriate F key).
- 6. After the restart the TPM will be prepared and you can then use the Actions menu to Turn TPM off, Change Owner Password, Clear TPM or Reset TPM Lockout.
- 7. A wizard will help take you through any setup steps.
